
#### Playground Pals

#### **Black History Month**

During Black History Month, the children of Colindale have enjoyed learning about different aspects of Black History. 4P kicked off the month with their class assembly focusing on some significant people and events in Black British History. Year 1 learnt about Rosa Parks and Ruby Bridges, American activists as well as Maggie Aderin-Pocock, a British space scientist. They also learnt a about the Windrush Generation, Carnival in PE and had a go at playing the djembe drums in music. Year 2 also learnt about some important Black figures such as the artist Merissa Hylton and the chef, Levi Roots. In Year 3, the children retold the story, Coming to England by Floella Benjamin. The story is about a how 10-year-old Floella come to start a new life in England in 1960. Year 4 wrote newspaper articles about the Windrush Generation. They learnt about how many people from the Caribbean came to Britain onboard the ship, The Empire Windrush and they played a vital role in helping to rebuild Britain after WWII. They also wrote about how they overcame many challenges to become an important part of British society. Year 5 wrote a diary entry as Olaudah Equiano, an enslaved man who bought his freedom and became an important figure in the fight for the abolition of slavery. The children in Year 6 learnt about how black people from the commonwealth countries contributed during the Second World War. The children used maps, photographs, and real-life accounts to help them to explore common misconceptions about the experiences of those who fought for Britain during the war.

## Recipe of the Month

The recipe is adopted from Pro Veg International, and it is plant based.

Soya meat skewers (Soya souvlaki)



These vegan Greek Souvlaki skewers are made from soya chunks. The meaty texture and the tasteful marinade make the soya chunks perfect for juicy, grilled skewers.

Time: 125 minutes Servings: 4

## Ingredients

#### For the soja medallions:

750 ml vegetable broth

125 g soya medaillons1 small beetroot (raw)

## Ingredients

#### For the marinade:

2 tbsp	olive oil
2 tbsp	vegan Worcestershire sauce
1 ½ tsp	yeast extract
1 tsp	dried oregano
1 tsp	dried thyme
½ tsp	dried rosemary
½ tsp	powdered juniper berries
½ tsp	smoked paprika
¼ tsp	chili powder
¼ tsp	ground black pepper
1	garlic clove, crushed

#### Instructions

For the soja medaillons:

Put the soya medallions and the vegetable broth in a medium-sized pot over a medium-low heat.

Peel the beetroot and add it to the pot.

Let simmer for about 15 minutes, until the soya meat is tender. Remove from the stove and let cool.

Then strain the soya chunks and press them firmly to drain the water.

#### Instructions

#### For the marinade:

Put all the marinade ingredients into a container and mix well. Then dip each soya medallion in the marinade, making sure that they are all thoroughly covered.

Mix well, and let them marinate in the container for at least an hour.

Once properly marinated, the medallions are ready to grill. Put them on skewers (4-5 per skewer depending on size), brush them with a bit of extra oil and grill them for 3-4 minutes, until they have a nice brown crust and slight grill marks.

#### For serving:

Serve with lemon wedges and sprinkle with a pinch of dried herbs and smoky cajun spice. Delicious!



























## Messages from the school office
