What is inappropriate content – a summary of what parents need to know about the issue

Voice over:

As the internet holds a lot of content, some of which is adult in nature, it's possible that children may stumble across things that are not suitable for their age or stage of development.

Stats show that 63% of teens believe that accessing inappropriate content online accidently is an issue

Also, what you think is inappropriate for your child may differ from a child's view and will depend on their age and maturity level

In summary, inappropriate content consists of information or images that upset your child, material that's directed at adults, inaccurate information or information that might lead your child into unlawful or dangerous behavior.

Accessing inappropriate content is possible on any internet enabled device. Your child may stumble upon unsuitable material on websites, apps, links sent by friends, and or while chatting to others online.

The children in Little Rainbows have been reading and learning about The Gruffalo story. They enjoyed listening to the story and now know the characters very well. They learnt new descriptive words and phrases such as "turned out toes" and "terrible teeth".

The children also had fun making "Gruffalo crumble" in our small world area. They used their creativity to make Gruffalo headbands and masks and used their fine motor skills to make models of the Gruffalo with coffee-scented play dough.





The children have also been learning about summer and what changes it brings to our lives, such as different weather and how we need to wear certain clothing and sun-screen to keep us safe.

They didn't miss the opportunity to enjoy the changing weather, whether it be the rain or the sunshine! They enjoyed water activities and have been "jumping in muddy puddles" and collecting rainwater when it rained heavily outside.






NURSERY







Nursery children have been focusing on patterns during this term. After reading one of our favourite books, Pants, the children looked around nursery to find as many different patterns as possible. We had lots of fun finding stripes, spots, zig-zags and floral patterns. We then moved on to learning about repeating patterns. The children were set four challenges. Could they describe a repeating pattern, continue a pattern made by an adult, spot the errors in a pattern and finally.....make a repeating pattern of their own? There was such a lot of enthusiastic



pattern making all week! Some children made action patterns too: jump, hop, jump hop. As you can see from the photographs, pattern making was enjoyed by everyone, even when dressed as the queen!

RECEPTION





Reception began preparing for Year One. We have crushed milestones together, such as completing the monkey bars, understanding mathematical concepts, writing sentences and making friends. Now, it's time to push our boundaries even more by engaging in fun PE lessons. Children have brought their PE kits and practised getting changed by themselves. When they were ready, they all walked nicely to the field or the courts to begin their first PE lessons. What fabulous fun they had! All three

classrooms engaged in different activities every week to practise as many skills as possible, such as jumping over hurdles; balancing an egg on a spoon; throwing and catching with a friend; and many more. The children are very excited about Sports Day, and they can't wait for it to happen.



YEAR 1



For maths this term, Year 1 have been learning all about time. We have been looking at analogue clocks. We have learned the two hands on a clock – the minute hand and the hour hand. We now know that the minute hand is long, and the hour hand is short. We have looked at time to the hour and to half past the hour. The children have been working hard on grasping this new concept. We have been practicing making the time on clocks as well as drawing the hands to make our own time. The children have particularly enjoyed Clock Bingo!




We have also begun to look at position and direction. We have been practicing turns using Bears and ourselves, some of us have become a little dizzy too!! This new skill will also help us direct the BeeBots for our computing lessons. Everyone is super excited to work with them!

During our science lessons this term we have been exploring the plants around us. We visited the quad and the greenhouse and discussed which plants we could see and what they need to grow. We also talked about the different things we need for planting and searched for the tools that we could use. Before we started planting the flowers, we learnt how to use the tools correctly. We then had a go at planting, following a step-by-step guide that was taught to us. We continue to enjoy watering our plants and admire them when we walk past them on our way to playtime. We also wrote instructions on how to plant flowers.






Our new topic this term is 'Under the sea'. In **English**, we talked about what children know about the animals that live in the sea. We also read lots of poems about the 'sea creatures.' Children learnt that poems usually have some repetition or rhythm, but they also learnt that not every poem has to rhyme. Children had an opportunity to read some poems themselves, they did a very good job in practicing reading with expression and a clear voice. Then, they







In Year 2, our topic for this term is 'Seasides'. The children have really enjoyed our new book, 'The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch' by Ronda and David Armitage. The story is set by the sea and tells the story of a lighthouse keeper called Mr Grinling and his wife, Mrs Grinling. The children read the original story and then spent time innovating their own version. They used their wonderful imaginations to create new characters and change key parts of the story, to make it their own. They drew their own story maps to help organise and plan their ideas and produced excellent pieces of writing! We cannot wait for our trip to the seaside!



This term in Year 3 the children have continued to learn all about Ancient Egyptian civilization. They have enjoyed reading and acting the story of Osiris. The children learnt about the features of a playscript, wrote their own playscript and were able to see their play come to life by acting it out. In English, the children are currently reading The Scarab's Secret. This is also inspired by Ancient Egyptians and the tale of how the humble beetle was honored. The moral of this story is about how everything has a place and purpose, and no matter how small something is, it can make a big difference!

In History, Year 3 have travelled back in time to learn about the culture and achievements of the Ancient Egyptians. The children explored how the pyramids were built and are going to learn about the mummification process!

In Science, the children have loved learning about plants. They dissected a lily to find out the process of pollination and how a seed is made. They learnt about the importance of a male and female parts of a plant, and the three main pollinators, bees, butterflies and wind.





Garden Update








In English we have been looking at twisted fairy tales. First, we read the story of Jack and the Beanstalk and then we retold the story from the perspective of the giant. "I enjoyed creating the character of the giant and thinking why I didn't like Jack." Ali, 4B.

Currently Year 4 are focusing on gender swapped fairy tales. Children have been thoroughly enjoying reading the fairy tale of Snowdrop and the Evil King. "This is like the story of Snow White, but the twist is that the genders are swapped, Snow White is Snowdrop and he is the prince!" Summer, 4B

In **DT**, Year 5 have been practicing a variety of different stitches, such as straight, back, whip and blanket stitches. We used cotton thread, which we learnt comes from a cotton plant and grows in hot countries like USA. 'I love sewing as it is very relaxing.' (Luca 5T)

In **English** we are writing a newspaper report about Superman saving a plane. We have practiced writing in the passive voice, this means when a sentence focuses on what is happening, rather than who is doing it. An example of a passive sentence is: The plane was saved by Superman.

In **Science**, Year 5 have been learning about reversible and irreversible changes. 5J learnt that a reversible change is when something changes from one state (solid, liquid and gas) to another state and then changes back. We also learnt that a change is irreversible if something cannot be changed back again. 5J learnt that the salt and water in a solution can be separated and is an example of a reversible change.

"We put a chocolate button (solid state) in our hands but as we held the chocolate, the heat melted the chocolate into a liquid. The liquid chocolate cooled into a solid state though the chocolate did not return to the original shape". (Gabija, 5J)

"We learnt that sugar dissolving, wax melting and butter melting are reversible changes. We also learnt that biscuits baking, bread toasting and wood burning are irreversible changes". (Hana, 5J)

In **Geography**, Year 5 have been learning about the features of their local area and learning to use compass directions. On Thursday 24th of June, 5N took a trip down to Colindale Tube Station whilst drawing and annotating a sketch of their route.



"We grouped up into 4 and helped each other with equipment such as trundle wheels and compasses". Jakub Pietrucha 5N.



We sketched everything we saw so we could draw a more detailed drawing when we got back to school". Rio Hall.

In Year 6, we have been studying the works of Banksy and created stencils to make our own graffiti art using spray paints.

Aaliyah 6M - 'In Art, we learnt about Banksy (the graffiti artist) and looked at his artwork from around the UK. We then created our own throwies (graffiti fonts) and used that to make our own stencils. I really liked cutting out the stencils because you had to be very careful and go slowly, but it came out really well. I had a lot of fun in these lessons and learnt some really cool techniques, my graffiti work came out great as well!'

Marwa 6D- 'In art, we made our own graffiti, like the artist Banksy, after learning about throwies and creating our own designs. I made a stencil out of card and used different colours for my background like light purple and pink. I used light brown spray paints along with dark purple and finished it off with splatters of black spray paint. This is my favourite piece of artwork so far!'

Meesha and Angana 6N- 'In art, we designed and cut out stencils, then spray painted over them to create our own graffiti art. A few weeks before, we created our own throwies and used them to make our stencils. We spray painted on our cardboard background that we decorated and then some of our classmates splattered a bit of paint on them to finish them off. This has been the art that we have enjoyed so far!'













OTHER NEWS

Rights Respecting

Since returning to school fully in March, staff have delivered discrete sessions with a rights theme, as part of PHSE lessons.

The regular 'article of the month' facilitates discussion around many rights-based themes. A crucial part of the Rights Respecting ethos is promoting pupil voice, which we continue to do via meetings of the School Council and Eco Committee. The gold journey will resume in full, from September when we will hold elections for new Rights Champions.



One of the action points we are working on to help us achieve gold level, is how we will enable our pupils to look at global issues from a rights perspective whilst developing a heightened sense of justice and equity. An important part of this is helping children develop a sense of critical enquiry.

Luckily, an incredible opportunity has come our way, via the British Council's 'Connecting Classrooms' initiative. This initiative enables schools, from the UK and abroad, to team up and collaborate on a joint project. In the current climate, the work will be done online.



Colindale school has been teamed with a school in Ghana, Kaneshie Junior High School, which is based in the capital city, Accra.

The project, starting in September, will be led by Hussein Najjar and Jenni McDonough. Other staff members and classes will be involved during the autumn term.

As part of our school vision and ethos to keep our pupils healthy and safe, and support sustainable travel, Year 6 children had the opportunity to take part in Bikebability Level 2 cycle training offered by the London Borough of Barnet. The training develops skills for cycling on single-lane roads with simple junctions and moderate traffic and includes the core functions for safe and responsible cycling:

- -Making good and frequent observations
- -Choosing and maintaining the most suitable riding position
- -Communicating intentions clearly to others
- -Understanding priorities on the road, particularly at junctions

The training was a success, and the children, who took part, were awarded with a certificate and a Level 2 badge. Well done!

 the libraries can arrange to post the pack out if required.




