Year 4 trip to Verulanium

On Monday 8th November, Year 4 visited Verulamium Museum. They travelled by coach and spent the day exploring Roman ruins, artefacts the museum grounds. They also took part in a workshop where they handled real life Roman artefacts. The children showed exemplary behaviour and handled the artefacts with care throughout. Whilst exploring the grounds, the children got to see parts of the Roman wall built by the Romans to defend the city of Verulamium from enemies. This wall is over 1700 years old and we were impressed by how much of it still remains today! Jordan from 4J was particularly impressed with the artefacts inside the museum, "I can't believe the coins they used look like the ones we have". Abdulrahman from 4P enjoyed learning some facts about the Romans. "I liked everything at Verulamium! I learnt that the Romans built walls to protect their cities." Connecting Classrooms Project

This is a project run by the British Council, where UK schools are twinned with schools in other countries. Colindale School has been twinned with Kaneshie Kingsway Primary School in Accra, Ghana.

Class 3CH were invited to take part in this project and during the October half-term holiday the children were given two tasks to do.

For task 1, the children had to take and print out a photograph showing 'The view from a window in my house', to give the Kaneshie Primary children some idea of what our local area looks like. Some children chose to draw their view. The children in Ghana will do the same task to show us their local environment.

Task two involved choosing and researching about a famous London landmark, finding facts and information to share with the children in Ghana.

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Multi-Faith Day

On Friday 12th November, Colindale hosted a Multifaith day to celebrate National Interfaith Day. We invited local religious representatives from Barnet Multifaith Forum (BMFF). All year groups took part in exciting activities across the curriculum such as, making and eating Samosas in DT, designing rangoli patterns with 2D shapes in Maths, tasting special foods from different, an acrostic poem in English and reading tales from different religions.

As part of their topic on celebrations Year 1 listened to a representative from the Hindu religion retell the story of Raama and Sita, which explains why and how Diwali is celebrated. They were given a chance to ask questions from the story and share what they have been learning in class. Year 3 also had the opportunity to meet Suchita Rajadhvaska from Barnet Multifaith Forum and learn about how dress and symbols play an important role in everyday life for a Hindu person.

Year 2 had an amazing opportunity to meet a Priest, Father Duckett from St Mathias Church. He talked about the different features of the Church and spoke about his role in the community. He showed the children artefacts he had bought from the Church and explained what they were used for. The children were able to handle the artefacts and dress up as a Priest. This was a good introduction to their topic on special places.

Year 4 met with Thami and Pamela Nomvete representitves from the Buddhist Faith. They shared their experiences of being a Buddhist and the basic teachings of Buddah. They listened to an exciting story and watched Pamela perform a special chant. The children worked really hard in preparing interesting and thoughtful questions for their visitors. Both women were impressed in the children's engangement.

Year 5 met with Propa Anwar the Vice chair of BMFF, who spoke about some important teaching of Islam and what her role as a Muslim entails for the community. The children gained an insight to the hard work the Muslim community in Barnet have done during the pandemic to support families and help people get vaccinated.

Rabbi Miriam visited Year 6 and delivered a fantastic workshop on her role as a Rabbi and the role of the High Priest in Judaism. She brought lots of artefacts linked to the discussion and children were able to dress up and were involved in deciding on the different duties for the roles. The children had worked hard during to week to prepare questions for the Rabbi. Well done Year 6!
