Year 2 London trip

Before going on the London Eye, we went for a river cruise on the River Thames. The children were excellent at spotting the famous London landmarks they had learnt about. They could remember what they were called and facts about them!

After the boat trip we went on the London Eye. Some of the children were a little scared of how high it was going, but everyone was very brave and really enjoyed it once they got right to the top. It was a beautiful day, and we could see all the sights of London. The children spotted Buckingham Palace, Big Ben, The Shard and could even see the Wembley Stadium arch!

After the London Eye everyone was really hungry, so we ate our lunch in the park and then we played on the play structures.


We then got back on the tube to come back to school. Some children were so tired they fell asleep!

Year 3 trip to the British Museum

On the 14th of October, Year 3 went back to Prehistoric Britain as they explored the Stone, Bronze,

and Iron Age exhibitions at the British Museum. They embarked on their journey with parent volunteers and teachers by walking down to Colindale Station and riding the northern line to Tottenham Court Road.

At school, the children learnt all about how people lived through these time periods. They had gathered knowledge about the different homes they built, the food they ate, the weapons they used to hunt for food, and the clothes they wore. They used this knowledge very well to identify different artefacts at the museum! Lots of children were blown away by how well the museum has





preserved objects. Haris in 3N said *"look at this skeleton that's just lying here!"*

The children spent lots of time carefully examining the magnificent objects from the prehistoric exhibit. Yoosuf from 3D was particularly curious about how farmers used stones when farming, and when hunting for animal skin to make clothes! He commented *"such a small stone had so many uses!"*

Some children in 3F were amazed by the Bronze Age selection. They could not believe what the Beaker People brought to

Britain, including beakers! One child asked, "how is it possible that they carried these big beakers when they went to fill up water?"

Once the children had completed their tour, they had the opportunity of strolling through the Egypt exhibition. The children appreciated the beauty and colour of the Egyptian culture. Many could not take their eyes off the large statues of animals, pharaohs, and hieroglyphics! It was a very exciting moment for the Year 3's because they found out that they will be learning about Ancient Egypt later in the year.

Lunch was enjoyed outside the museum gardens as the weather had been lovely and bright. It was a treat because the children got to play and relax in the sun. Just before they prepared for their journey back to school, the children sat on the steps outside the museum entrance, ready for the teachers to take a year group photo. To their teachers' surprise, the children began proudly singing the Colindale song - *"we are the children of Colindale school…!"* It was a very sweet moment, and there was lots of laughter. Overall, it was a fantastic and successful day out. The children behaved very well, had lots of fun, and are already asking about their next trip!

Black History Month

During October, we celebrated Black History Month with storytelling sessions and workshops delivered by **Big Foot Arts Education.**

The children in Reception and KS1 took part in a story telling session where they learnt about the experiences of a child from the Windrush Generation who came to live in Britain. They listened to a story told from the viewpoint of a friend of Floella Benjamin, a Trinidadian-British actress, singer, presenter, author, businesswoman and

politician. The children explored issues of identity, difference and acceptance.

The children in KS2 took part in a Black & British workshop where they learnt about influential black British people, such as Malorie Blackman, Lenny Henry and Maggie Aderin-Pocock. The children enjoyed creating role play scenarios, raps and quizzes to present important information about these individuals.



As well as these workshops, the children also took part in other learning opportunities during this month:

Year 1 learnt about Ruby Bridges, tasted exotic fruits and played the Djembe drums.


Year 2 tasted Afro-Caribbean food and created collages based on the artwork of Marisa Hylton.


Switch Off day


