Reception Curriculum Overview Spring term 2023 Classes RF, RJW, RKW




This curriculum overview tells you what your child will be learning this term.

We will continue to send out phonics information in the home learning folders. Please spend some time helping your child to learn the new phonemes and tricky words. The activities we send home are a continuation of what your child has been learning in class. Please write a comment about your child's progress with their home learning in the folder, this information is very helpful for your child's class teacher.

This term, the children who are beginning to read by themselves will bring home a phonics reading book once per week, as well as a book from the library for you to share.

Please take some time to teach your child how to fasten their own coats and to put on their own gloves and scarves if they can't manage this independently. Some children are still finding it difficult to use a knife and fork to cut up their food and to feed themselves at lunchtimes, the mealtime staff cannot always do this for the children, so please teach your child to do this for themselves.

Skills we will be focusing on indoors and outdoors



Communication and Language

- Articulating ideas and thoughts in well-formed sentences
- Using talk to help work out problems and organise thinking
- Retelling a story, once they have developed a deep familiarity with the text
- Listening and talking about non-fiction texts to develop familiarity with new knowledge and vocabulary

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Making new friends and trying new activities
- Showing resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge
- Showing sensitivity to others' needs and feelings
- Managing their own needs, such as dressing, toileting, and healthy food choices



Physical Development

Gross motor skills:

 Developing overall body strength, co-ordination, balance and agility needed to successfully engage with physical activities such as dance, climbing and sports



- Combining different movements with ease and fluency
- Developing confidence, competence, precision and accuracy when engaging in activities that involve a ball

Fine motor skills:

- Beginning to use anticlockwise () movement and retrace vertical lines when writing
- Forming lowercase letters correctly
- Developing competence using tools, such as knives, forks, spoons, scissors

Literacy



- Describing main story settings, events and principal characters in stories
- Enjoying an increasing range of books
- Jolly Phonics: recognising letters and their sounds (refer to Tapestry and home learning folders)
- Reading and spelling some tricky words
- Beginning to read words and simple sentences
- Spelling simple words and beginning to write short sentences



Maths

- Recognising numbers 0-10
- Counting beyond 10
- In practical activities and discussion, beginning to use the vocabulary involved in adding and subtracting
- Subitise numbers to 5
- Automatically recall number bonds to 5
- Using language related to time, e.g. morning, afternoon, evening, yesterday, today, tomorrow
- Comparing length, weight and capacity
- Talking about shapes and their properties, e.g. curved, point, sides, corners

Understanding the World

Past and Present

- Talking about how they have changed since they were babies
- Comparing characters from stories, including figures from the past

People, Culture and Communities

- Recognising people have different beliefs and celebrate special times in different ways
- Finding out about members of their community, E.g. shopkeeper, dentists, nurses, police, firefighters

The World

- Finding out about similarities and differences in the natural world around them
- Recognising some environments that are different to the one in which they live

Expressive Arts and Design


- Listening attentively, move to and talk about music
- Learning new songs linked to the topic



- Learning about the work of an artist and use their ideas to create their own artwork.
- Exploring a variety of art materials to express their ideas and feelings
- Developing storylines in their pretend play

Characteristics of Learning

- Initiating activities
- Showing a 'can do' attitude
- Taking a risk, engaging in new experiences, and learning by trial and error
- Maintaining focus on an activity for a period of time
- Persisting with an activity when challenges occur
